
In Memoriam

The Congress Board approves Central Land Council's draft housing plan

The Board was presented with a draft plan for housing reform by a representative from Central Land Council (CLC). The plan details the development of a new Aboriginal Housing Model which proposes a radical change from the current structure of community housing as it proposes that control at each level sits under entities with Aboriginal Boards. The plan, which has also been accepted by all joint NT Land Councils aligns well with the Congress Board's previously published position on the importance of housing and health. The new structure would finance, build and maintain housing in Aboriginal communities, and provide tenancy support. It will also make provision for the support of Aboriginal construction and maintenance.

The Congress Board approves Food Security position paper

The Board of Directors was presented with a proposed position paper on food security, which outlines seven major policy actions that Congress has on this very important determinant of health and wellbeing. This paper, which was approved and adopted by the Board, comes ahead of a planned fresh food summit in 2021. The paper will be available shortly on our website.

There have also been submissions made into political representation in the NT, submission to House of Representatives Standing

Committee on Social Policy and Legal Affairs into family, domestic and sexual violence and submission into aged care inquiry. These are available on our website.



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Town cultural protocol developed

Work has gone into the development of a town protocol document designed to guide visitors while working for Congress in Mparntwe to be aware of and maintain cultural safety while in the community. Key Arrernte people were approached as part of the consultations. The male health and women's health committee nominated key people who needed to be consulted and the Congress cultural lead was also consulted. The booklet goes through things like the context of what health means, what is appropriate dress, shaking hands, looking people in the eyes, sorry business, kinship, smoking, avoidance, gender. This document joins a number of cultural protocol documents developed in collaboration with remote community health boards. All staff will have access to these documents at induction and during their employment, which form an important step in creating a culturally safe environment for community and workers alike.

HR Report and Congress welcomes new safety manager

The Board was provided with an update by the Human Resources General Manager, including the introduction of Congress' new Safety Manager. The safety manager outlined his plans to move Congress toward the most up to date ISO standard, to ensure that we are continuing to provide all staff with a safe environment in which they do their jobs, in line with the most current safety standards.

An important strategic objective for Congress is the focus on employing and supporting Aboriginal staff, and to continue to increase the number and proportion of Aboriginal staff at all levels and in all roles. To expand on Congress' work in this area the HR report included a summary about new initiatives in place for further improving

Aboriginal employment. The recruitment team is working at trying to attract more Aboriginal applicants for roles across the organisation, including liaising with employment providers and other industry partners. The HR team is also working with Aboriginal staff to identify and advance in their career aspirations, through training and opportunity.

2019-2020 Finances in a 'break even' position

The Business Services Report was provided to the Board, which included a detailed summary of the end of year financials for the year 2019 – 2020. As a not for profit orgaisation, Congress aims to break even and we are glad to report that even after a difficult period through COVID-19, Congress is in a break even position and is operating at a solvency rate of 1.6.

Three new Research applications approved

The Board resolved to approve the following new research projects:

- » Vitamin D Supplementation to prevent respiratory infections among Indigenous children in the NT: a randomized controlled trial
- Audit of the management of the pelvic inflammatory disease in a remote
 Central Australian Primary health care service
- » Improving access to primary health care and reducing hospitalisation by optimising telehealth for remote and rural Australians
